MERRY CHRISTMAS, DEAR PARISH FAMILY!

We are joyfully thankful that, this year also, God has given us yet another opportunity to celebrate the birth of his only Begotten Son, our Lord, Jesus Christ into the world. Certainly, there are also other things that we are thankful for as we celebrate this year's Christmas. On the other hand, though, some of us are celebrating this year's Christmas with grieving hearts for a loss of a loved one or a job, or because of any other misfortune. Nonetheless, when we remember the Paschal mystery events Jesus went through, our hearts fill with strength and hope on Christmas because Jesus' birth renews us in all challenges.



During this year's Advent Season, we have come to realize that as the Lord comes to us, we too have to go to him. Our encounter with the Lord changes us profoundly and fills us with love, joy, and happiness. It also moves us to work for peace within ourselves, among peoples, and nations. It has taught us that we need to emulate Jesus Christ in caring about the poor, unprivileged, abandoned, afflicted, abused, sidelined, and oppressed. This is one of the major reasons we are always called to "go to the house of the Lord" (Ps. 122:1, 4) – for every time God feeds us with his word in his house – i.e., the church as a gathering place for worship, we get more enlightened and increasingly become people of Christ's light and "throw off the works of darkness" (Rm. 13:12b). Therefore, let us embrace and live in the Lord's light, not only on Christmas Day, but every day of our lives. Let us be messengers of Jesus' glad tidings to everyone in the world as we allow God's word – i.e., the holy Scripture – to instruct us in our day-to-day engagements.

This Advent Season has taught us that when we heed God's word, our lives get and remain filled with exuberance because our spiritual blindness and deafness disappear. We get to realize that God's love and faithfulness are forever; and we are able to remain hopefully patient amidst the challenges of life – because God does not disappoint. And, as our hearts reel in the salvation the Lord brings, joy and happiness abound in us.

Throughout the Christmas Season, we remember that Jesus – Emmanuel (God is with us) – is the ultimate sign of God's love for us and the world. We should, then, never allow the lures or challenges of the earthly life to separate us from him. He is the Lord and Master of history and the universe – whose identity and mission are well delineated in the holy Scriptures. So, let us by regular introspection stand sinless before him and proclaim him to the world.

May you all be filled with the joys of Christmas.
