MARCH FOR LIFE REGISTRATION DEADLINE EXTENDED!

Register now to attend the 50th annual March for Life in Washington, DC on Friday, Jan. 20, 2023! **Registration deadline extended to Dec. 28 or when buses are full,** whichever comes first. We understand that Christmas week can be challenging and sometimes mail is a bit slower, so if you are planning to register, or if you have any questions, please email aledoux@worcesterdiocese.org and let us know.

Buses will leave from St. Paul's Cathedral on Thurs., Jan. 19 following the Respect Life Mass at 7:30 p.m., and will travel to the Basilica of National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC in time for Friday morning Mass followed by the March for Life at noon.

Thanks to the overturning of Roe v Wade, the March will end at the U.S. Capitol instead of the Supreme Court, in recognition of the fact that the halls of Congress are where much advocacy for life must be done going forward.

Buses will return to Worcester immediately following the March, arriving back at St. Paul's at approximately 1:00 a.m. on Saturday, Jan. 21. MERRY CHRISTMAS, DEAR PARISH FAMILY!

We are joyfully thankful that, this year also, God has given us yet another opportunity to celebrate the birth of his only Begotten Son, our Lord, Jesus Christ into the world. Certainly, there are other things that we are thankful for as we celebrate this year's Christmas. Surely, some of us are celebrating this year's Christmas with grieving hearts for a loss of a loved one or a job, or because of any other misfortune. But when we remember the Paschal mystery events Jesus went through, our hearts get filled with strength and hope on Christmas because Jesus' birth renews us amid all challenges.

During this year's Advent Season, we have realized that as the Lord comes to us, we too have to go to him. And our encounter with the Lord changes us profoundly and fills us with love, joy, and happiness. It also moves us to work for peace within ourselves, among peoples, and nations. We get to realize that God's love and faithfulness are forever; and we are able to remain hopefully patient amidst the challenges of life – because God does not disappoint. And, as our hearts reel in the salvation the Lord brings, joy and happiness abound in us.

Throughout the Christmas Season, we remember that Jesus – Emmanuel (God is with us) – is the ultimate sign of God's love for people and the world.
